Advent

The word "advent" means coming, or arrival, and as such, the Christian church calls these four weeks before Christmas Advent. We wait for the coming of Emmanuel, God with us. It is a time during which we participate in anticipation by moving from darkness into light.

This year we are using the color blue for our liturgical art. Many churches use blue in order to distinguish this season from the purple of the more penitential season of Lent. Though it may seem new to those of us who are accustomed to using purple, it is by no means new to our tradition. It was used before the 12th century in the western church. Early art shows church leaders in ornately decorated blue robes. Shades of blue symbolize royalty, the coming of the King, hope, the night sky before the dawn, the sea before creation, and Mary.

Incidentally, the third week of Advent, this year on December 12, is the halfway point of the Season. In the Roman Catholic Church, that Sunday is referred to as "Gaudete" Sunday, from the Latin word for joy. We also refer to that Sunday as the "joy" Sunday, the first Sunday being hope, the second Sunday being peace and the fourth Sunday being love.

We have painted stars on our banners for all sorts of reasons. Think of the brightness in the dark sky, the coming of the Cosmic Christ, and (from Psalm 19) "the heavens declare the glory of God." And, certainly it was a star that shone brightly in the night sky above the tiny manger where our Savior first appeared.
